Community Programs & Initiatives

Improving the health and well-being of our neighbors









Columbia University Irving Medical Center (CUIMC) is committed to contributing to the health and well-being of our neighbors. CUIMC offers more than 30 community programs and initiatives, spanning college prep programs for youth, school-based dental clinics, community-based participatory research, and clinical home visits for our community's most vulnerable residents. The Office of Community Service Programs works to connect our local community with the valuable resources available at CUIMC. Each year, these programs serve tens of thousands of community residents. These programs include:

Columbia Student Medical Outreach Program (CoSMO): This free primary care clinic provides uninsured and uninsurable residents of Washington Heights and Northern Harlem with comprehensive services that address the physical, social, and behavioral aspects of health. It involves CUIMC students studying medicine, nursing, physical therapy, public health, and social work.

State Pre-College Enrichment Program (S-PREP): Hosted by the Office of Diversity and Multicultural Affairs at the Vagelos College of Physicians and Surgeons, the program is a free high school and college preparatory program designed for students who are interested in pursuing a career in medicine or related STEM fields.

Community Dental Programs: Columbia's College of Dental Medicine is the major provider of oral health care services to underserved populations in Harlem, Inwood, and Washington Heights through clinics and a variety of services, including school-based clinics and a mobile dental center.

Nurse Practitioners Home Visit Program: Columbia School of Nursing's Nurse Practitioner Group offers comprehensive in-home primary care for elderly and homebound patients in the Washington Heights and Inwood neighborhoods.

Project STAY (Services to Assist Youth): Project STAY is part of the Harlem Health Promotion Center based at Columbia's Mailman School of Public Health. The Project provides medical and psychosocial services at its Washington Heights clinic for adolescents and young adults living with HIV/ AIDS in and around New York City. The STAY team is comprised of medical providers, social workers, and health educators.

- Project STAY (Services to Assist Youth): The program provides medical and case management services to people with HIV, STI, and Hep C**
- Turn 2 Us: A mental health promotion and prevention program for local elementary schools**
- CHALK (Choosing Healthy and Active Lifestyles for Kids): A program designed to reduce the prevalence of childhood obesity**
- WIN for Asthma: Provides culturally sensitive support and education to children with asthma and their caregivers**
- Columbia Harlem Homeless Medical Partnership (CHHMP): A clinic that provides medical care to the homeless or uninsured
- Columbia Student Medical Outreach Program (CoSMO): A clinic that provides primary health care to the uninsured
- Columbia University Harm Reduction Clinic: A clinic that provides free medical care and screening to drug users and sex workers
- VP&S Human Rights and Asylum Clinic: A clinic that provides medical evaluations to those seeking asylum

- Q Clinic: A clinic that provides primary care services, screenings, and PrEP to the LGBTQ community
- Young Men's Clinic: The clinic focuses on male sexual and reproductive health issues**
- APOYO: A program for pregnant adolescents
- Healthy Haven: A yearly event to promote health and wellness in our community

- Northern Manhattan Study (NOMAS): A research study of stroke and risk factors
- Medical Center Neighborhood Fund (MCNF): The Fund raises money from CUIMC, NYP and NYSPI employees for local nonprofit organizations

Community Space

- Community Space Use: CUIMC provides access to its facilities for community groups
- Haven Plaza: Haven Plaza provides an open public green space for the surrounding community.
